

2024-25 Discipline and Behavior Data Release Summary

Collection Changes


The 2024-25 school year marks the second year for a number of required changes to the discipline and behavior collection. The changes allow additional analysis and level of detail. Details of the change are outlined below.

- In the 2022 legislative session, House Bill 22 1376 updated the discipline and behavior collection and included requirements for district and state level reporting alongside other data on school learning environments.
- Data is now collected at the student level with each incident connected to a behavior, a student, and discipline action. Trends for this data are reported at the district and state level and disaggregated by student groups.

Incidents and Behaviors

There were a total of 109,438 unique behavior incidents reported during the 2024-25 school year. In each incident, one or more students could have been involved and there may be multiple discipline actions.

- Three of the 16 behavior categories accounted for 80% of the total behavior incidents: detrimental behavior, disobedience/defiant or repeated interference, and other code of conduct violations.
- Drug and alcohol violations accounted for 10% of behaviors.
- High-severity behaviors, including but not limited to dangerous weapons, felony, robbery, and sexual violence, accounted for 1% of behaviors.




^{*}The remaining behavior incidents (1st, 2nd Degree or Vehicular Assault, Robbery, Other Felony, Sexual Violence, and Rape or Attempted Rape) add up to a count of less than 1,000.




Discipline Actions

During the 2024-25 school year, there were 132,892 discipline actions reported. This is a 3.7% increase (4,687 actions) from the previous school year. For each incident and behavior, one or more action was selected that could include classroom removal, in-school suspension, out-of-school suspension, expulsion, or other discipline action. There were behaviors that resulted in multiple discipline actions.

- The majority of discipline actions involved suspensions, with a total of 106,179 in-school and out-of-school suspensions during the 2024-25 school year. This equates to 80% of discipline actions.
- The number of out-of-school suspensions decreased over the last school year from 70,597 to 66,213, which is a 6.2% decrease.
- The number of expulsions remained consistent in 2024-25 with 743 total expulsions compared to 744 from the previous year.


Students


There were 64,538 students involved in the 132,892 discipline actions, which is a slight decrease (2%) from the 65,791 students in 2023-24. This averages out to roughly 2 discipline actions per student during the 2024-25 school year, which remains consistent when compared to 2023-24. The 64,538 involved in discipline represents about 7.5% of the population in Colorado. However, within the population, involvement is not evenly distributed. The following comparisons to student population are using the attendance collection K-12 count.

- About 55% of the students involved in one or more discipline incidents were in 6th-9th grade.
- Male students represent the majority of students in the discipline collection (68.8% of the students disciplined). This is consistent with the past three years.
- Students receiving special education services represented 21.5% of students within the discipline collection, while these students represent 14.2% of the overall student population.
- Students who are multilingual learners represented 16.9% of students within the discipline collection. These students represent 15.2% of the overall student population.
- Hispanic or Latino students represent the largest racial/ethnic group represented in the discipline collection at almost half (46%) of the students. Hispanic or Latino students represent 36% of the student population.

*Note that students may be include in multiple categories (for instance if they are male and Hispanic).

Terms

- **Incident:** Incident refers to a unique event that was reported.
- **Behavior:** For each incident, a behavior is selected from one of 16 state codes.
- **Discipline Action:** For each incident, one or more discipline actions is selected.
